## GETTING TO THE FALL CONFERENCE DIRECTIONS TO ASSISI COMMUNITY CENTER IN ROCHESTER, MN

The only entrance to Assisi Heights is located on **14th Street NW, at 10th Avenue NW.**

From the **north**, on US 52, exit RIGHT on 19th St. NW turn LEFT at the light. Immediately upon crossing over the highway, turn RIGHT and follow 11th Ave. NW to the first light (8/10 mile). Turn LEFT on 14th St. NW and proceed 1 1/2 blocks to the entrance, on LEFT.

From the **south** on US 52, exit RIGHT on 14th St. NW Continue to 10th Ave. NW (1/2 mile). Entrance on LEFT.

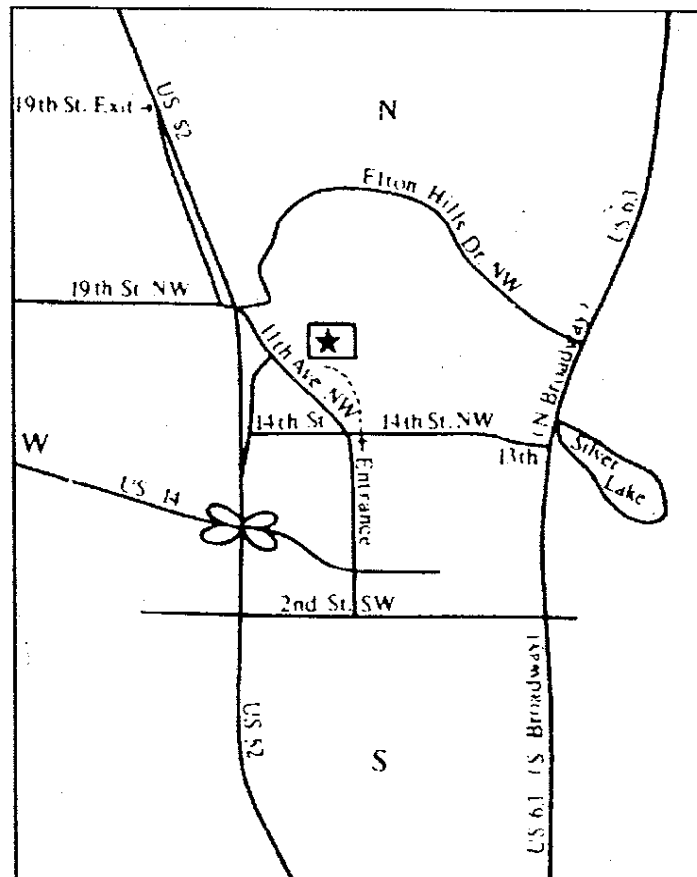

## Meeting of October 12<sup>th</sup>, 2002

**WELCOME.** The most exquisite meeting of poets, at least in the USA, is the **Geraldine Dodge Poetry Festival**. As announced in our previously mailed (with last T~D) program calendar, we will hear from local students, **Seth Meyer**, **Andrew Freedman** and **Colin Chambers** who were lucky to have been there, about their experiences.

All members in attendance of this meeting will receive a free copy of **Poetic Thoughts and Memories**, a collection by **June Emmanuel**.

The program schedule names **pantoum** as a poem assignment, but as everyone may know it is not a must. One 'formal' assignment for you is to bring a lot of poems to read and share. New poems on any topic are always welcome.

If you are not sure what a **pantoum** is, there is a brief summary on a following page.

## Last Meeting

We were in for a rare treat supplied by **Mary Hughes** who is a member of the Heartland group of the LOMP, a teacher and a marvelous poet. The topic of her talk, **Ten To The Inch**, is an extension of the title of her recently published book of poems, **Quilt Pieces**, and a fine metaphor between quilting and the writing of poetry. It reflects, among the Amish, the ability, in placing stitches, of a diligent and dedicated quilter. The implication is that every detail should be made a lot of thought.

It was nigh impossible to mark down or remember the many unique points **Mary** made re the nature of poetry as she sees it, but this reporter tends to agree wholeheartedly with most of her views and her references to the thoughts of many other poets whom she obviously has studied extensively. Here are some high points.

Recitation of rhythmic poetry has produced a notable slowdown of heart rates in a test group of listeners. There is reason to feel that good poetry is/must be as precise as geometry (and quilting)...as **Mary Ann Moore** felt that, in principle, nothing is too much trouble [referring to revision]...rhythm is made by small silences here and there...to get ideas for poems, pay quiet attention to surroundings to feel the nibble...processes of writing as many as writers... bullseye process: try to hit the outer rim [of target] and then move to the center (**M.D. Brown**)...on revision: re-see, revive (new other words), restore (put back words removed in earlier revisions)...refresh (poem has to mature, when you see it later again you may have a different mindset, see something you did not see before).

Thanks, **Mary Hughes** for a further lovely look at the crafting of the art. The appreciable number of listeners got everything they could ask and more



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A pantoum is made up of any number of quatrains, but the last may be replaced by a couplet. The lines can be in any meter and of any length as long as they are all of same length. The quatrains are interlocked, each having their 2<sup>nd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> lines — which are rhymed — reappear as the 1<sup>st</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> lines of the next. This leaves the 1<sup>st</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> lines of the very first quatrain to reappear, for purposes of resolution, as the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> lines of the last quatrain or instead as the closing couplet.

My apologies for including my pantoum assignment to demonstrate the form. It is not meant to be high poetry, in which case I would not have included it.

### The Problem With Assigned Poems!

As has been the custom, we will indulge in timely entertainment provided by some not all that well known but world famous artists to go along with the meal (actually after).

The 'formal' assignment is any poem celebrating the season and, hopefully, a fresh take. Yes, it may exceed a page. The informal assignment is to bring **any new poem(s) to read and share and any friends of poetry willing to admit they are**.

## Last Meeting

We had another of those presentations that leave your garrulous editor at a loss for adequate words.

Our guest speaker was **Joyce Sutphen**. She was gracious to forgive the misspelling of her last name in the November *Thistle-Down*.

Besides being a very impressive poet, **Joyce** is most obviously an excellent teacher, a fact witnessed by her ability to touch on exactly the kind of questions and points amateur poets are eager to know more about.

A huge thank you to Joyce Sutphen for sharing her experiences and expertise.

A special thank you to **Faye Mattison**, our secretary, for her excellent review (see other side) of **Joyces** presentation. For the real fine points we may be able to beg June Emmanuel for a copy of her tape recording of the proceedings

Unfortunately, your editor was unable to stay for the whole program and the book signing, but is happy to report that our membership is growing. His mailing list has been expanded by **four** more names.

## Next Meeting

Make plans for the January meeting at the usual hour and place on **January 11<sup>th</sup>, 2003**.

The assignment is to write an **Adelaide Crapsey Cinquain**. This is a five-line, syllabic verse poem, meaning that one of the constraints is the number of syllable counts per line, i.e., 2, 4, 6, 8 and 2 syllables in that order. The other constraint, if one can call it that, is that, like the *tanka*, it should be "a vehicle suited for reflective thought in poetry. It is a 'modern' form. As you will see, recent practice avoids caps, except when justified when a line begins a sentence. Samples are on the next page.

At the November meeting, SMPS poets were treated to a delightful presentation by poet and Gustavus Adolphus professor Joyce Sutphen entitled "The Green Fields." Joyce chose four contemporary Irish poets to give us a glimpse, in warm and lively word pictures, of the range of Irish poets. She discussed the works and lives of John Montague, Seamus Heaney, Eavan Boland and Dermot Healy. John Montague was the first Catholic poet in Northern Ireland to achieve international renown. (See his *Collected Poems*.) Seamus Heaney was Mozart to Montague's Salieri. The last line of his poem "Digging" expresses a connection between his father digging with a spade and Seamus digging with his pen. (See the collection *Opened Ground*, 1966-1996.) Eavan Boland, in her poem "Object Lessons," demonstrates how a woman, seen for centuries as a romantic object, now desires to write poetry of her own. The fourth poet, Dermot Healy, wrote "My House Is Tiny" and many other short poems.

Joyce's presentation left us with a huge appreciation for the depth of contemporary Irish poetry, due in part to her own strong emotional connection with poetry about living on farms or in small towns. Lately she has been writing sonnets about growing up on a farm in the 1950s. Her poems "Living in the Body" and "Girl on a Tractor" were chosen for Garrison Keilor's *Good Poems*. Joyce's poems illustrate well her idea that, while the prose writer expands, the poet's impulse is to condense and crystallize. Her books include *Straight Out of View* and *Coming Back to the Body*. Watch for a new book by Joyce Sutphen in March 2003 called *Naming the Stars*. Thank you, Joyce, for immersing us in the rich, green fields of Irish poetry, and for sharing your own exceptional poetry with us!

Guided by **Ed Brekke-Kramer**, we had a blast running around the store to prove that we could follow his clever idea of "*How to overcome writer's block in the bookstore*". Your editor, having some notion of Ed's literary acumen was only half-skeptical of what a writer's block had to do with a bookstore. 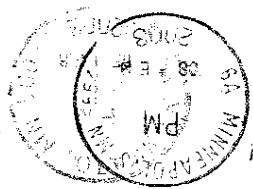
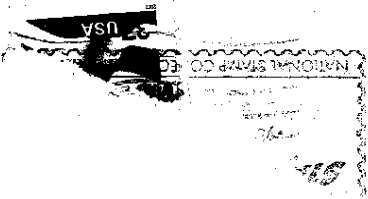
Start considering and making plans to attend the LOMP Spring Assembly in May. We will not have, due to a scheduling conflict with that assembly, a meeting in that Month.

Another fabulous program and get together. **Doris Stengel** did a marvelous job of passing along a goodly number of most interesting observations made at the Geraldine Dodge Poetry Festival. All that under the initially intriguing, but, as all present found out, extremely pertinent heading, **A Bit or a Bite**. Thus we see **sl** in words that relate to something smoothly wet, **dr** in words that denote things heavy and **sh** in words dealing with things brutal. A suggested text on that and other relevant aspects of poetry is *Art & Craft* by Michael Bugeja.

Your editor apologizes for having another commitment that forced him to miss the subsequent workshop. It is likely a report on that will be available in the June issue of the Thistle~Down.

## President's Message

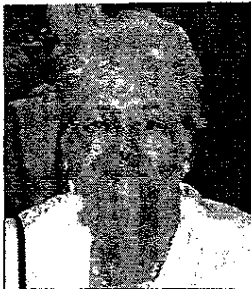
