SHIRLEY ENSRUD is really put off when she hears people saying "I seen" and "I have went". Both are grammatically incorrect, and often misused. "I have went" does not have subject-verb agreement. Verbs have different forms for singular and plural subjects only in the present and present perfect tenses. Recall that the present perfect tense is formed by adding one of the present-tense forms of HAVE (HAS OR HAVE) "He has gone" "They have gone". (Taken from ENGLISH REVIEW MANUAL, James A. Gowen McGraw-Hill Book Company, 1965)





All of us know of some sort of English usage which grates on our ears, or nerves. Bill Johnson suffers when he is exposed to archaic words in poetry. Archaism ... "gives warning that the word i dangerous except in the hands of an experienced writer who can trust his sense of congruity ... Archaic words thrust into a commonplace context to redeem its ordinariness are an abomination" (excerpt from A DICTIONARY OF MODERN ENGLISH USAGE by H.W. Fowler)

One example of a archaic word that "gets to" Bill is the word "STRIFE". It spoils any poem where it is used in Bill's eyes.

"It came without ribbons! It came without tags!


"It came without packages, boxes or bags!" And he puzzled three hours, till his puzzler was sore.

Our Assignment-





JANUARY ASSIGNMENT:

Like any connet, is a fixed pattern of fourteen lines of iambic pentameter rhythm, that is, fourteen iambic five-foot lines. Rhythm is the flow of accented and unaccented sylables. An iambic foot is a short syllable followed by an accented syllable. Thus, the rhythm of a sonnet is fourteen lines of: -/-/-/ with true accent on words and the end words in each line a rhyme word.

This form sets itself aside from other forms by its rhyme pattern: abba, abba, cde, cde. The sestet, or last six lines, may differ as: cd cd cd. The first eight lines are called the octave, and it is not permitted to break or vary the octave pattern and rhyme scheme. The first quatrain should introduce the theme, the second is a developement of theme. The sestet leaves room for contrast, contemplation, and conclusion.

Monica notes that her family and friends are the most important things in her life--and she is an important part of ougroup, and a cherished member of LOMP an SMPS!





FEBRUARY ASSIGNMENT:

VISSER SONNET. Like the ITALIAN SONNET, with iambic pentamiter, and the same rhyme pattern: abba, abba, ede, ede. The sestet, or last six lines, may differ as: ed ed ed. The Visser sonnet differs in that the rhymes are not at the end of lines, but scattered internally. The poet is free to choose the location of the rhyme within the line, as it is totally random. It is permissible to put one or two of the rhymes at the end of the lines. Much appreciation to AUDRAE VISSER, creator of the form, who took time over the phone to elaborate on this form, and gave her kind permission to print this sample:
