We welcome new members P. J. Doyle and Mavis Christensen and wish them good writing.


All our "Get well!" wishes go to Monica Haack who has a pinched nerve. Don't let that un-nerve you too much, Monica, and hurry back, you hear!

ACHIEVEMENT REPORT

of

THE SOUTHERN MINNESOTA POETS' SOCIETY January/February 1988

WE POINT WITH PRIDE to our out-of-state poets: FRANK ANTHONY, true friend and contributor to our Southern Minnesota Poets and League of Minnesota Poets. Remember, FRANK traveled from Vermont for a SMPS residency in February 1982 and, then lectured on "Poetry of the Unconscious" at the Mankato NFSPS convention last summer. He is founder and president of the New England Writers - Vermont, teaches freshmen English at Florida State University and is hard at work on the creative dissertation for his Phd toward which he has written over 1,000 poems in the last five years.

MAE DONALDSON BUCKEYE of Scottsdale Arizona, has had two splendid books published this year: HOUSE OF HIRAM (family account) beautifully illustrated and RUBY THROAT, finely achieved book of poems published by JESSEE POET PRESS. Mae had received (2) Honorable Mentions from Byline, (2) from Midwest Poetry Review and a number of recognitions from Poets at Work. It is difficult to believe that sparkling MAE is ninety one years young!

CHARLOTTE L. SEWARD, one of our founders, who now resides in Ottawa, Illinois, is starting a poetry group in that state. GOOD LUCK CHARLOTTE! She recently received an Honorable Mention from **World of Poetry** for her poem "Courthouse Square" - Free Verse: New American Category.

BARBARA STEVENS' poem, "Too Much Talk on a Walk," appeared in Bell's Letters. She also received a Special Honorable Mention in Byline's "Autumn Poem Contest" and an Honorable Mention in their "Any Theme" competition.

Other Byline recognitions went to PATRICIA JOHNSON for Honorable Mentions in their "Free Verse" and "Poems for Children" events; and to WILFRED JOHNSON, Special Honorable Mention - "Halloween Poems." He also received an Honorable Mention in the 1987 Byline Literary Awards in which only one monetary prize was given - the editor of Bronco Press of Oklahoma judging. In their last competition, judged by the editor of Nimrod, Bill received Fourth and Sixth Place.

Back to out-of-state members: ASTRID VAN DE WEGE is vice president of The Sun City Arizona Poetry Society. ASTRID has had ten poems published in the National PEO Record Magazine and given talks (2) to PEO organizations; also had poetry published in the Sun City News.

JUDGING EVENTS: Florida State Poetry Association's 1987 contest: SUSAN S. CHAMBERS - Gilbert Maxwell Memorial Award; BARBARA STEVENS - Jeanne Burns Memorial Award; JESSEE POET - Katherine F. Gordy Award; and WILFRED M. JOHNSON - #27 Student Awards. SMPS members who received awards in these competitions were PATRICIA JOHNSON, First Place #16 Poems for Children and JESSEE POET, 2nd Honorable Mention - Russel Leavitt Memorial Award.

Mississippi Poetry Society - Senryu - JESSEE POET, sponsor and judge. In other categories - JESSEE received a Third Place - Thomas Oliver Tate Memorial Award and 3rd Honorable Mention in the Poet Laureate of Mississippi Award.

POETRY SOCIETY OF OKLAHOMA, - #12 Hill Award was judged by WILFRED JOHNSON and #15 McBurney Award was judged by PATRICIA M. JOHNSON.

WILFRED & PATRICIA JOHNSON also judged the Social Significance Category for the Second Annual Howlin' Owl Poetry Contest, Tecolote Chapter of the California Federation of Chaparral Poets; Poets at Work Quarterly Contest - Theme: Love; First Jessee Family Awards Category #16 Religious - WILFRED judged the Jerilynn Award (over 300 entries) in the Second JFA Awards and PATRICIA, the Bonus Contest: Sonnets and Villanelles - October.

PATRICIA JOHNSON judged the Evy Glassberg Hodson Award (Free Verse - any subject) and WILFRED JOHNSON, the Edna Schoemaker Memorial Award (any subject - any form) for the Pennsylvania Poetry Societies 35th Annual Contest.

WILFRED, PATRICIA and JESSEE POET sponsored and judged Mini-Contests for the Florida State Poetry Assoc. in 1987, The JOHNSONS form: Cameo -- JESSEE - Subject: Green.

BARBARA STEVENS judged the Grand Prize, League of Minnesota Poets 1987 annual contes

MONICA HAACK's poem, "This Donkey's Destiny," appeared on the cover of a recent issue of River of Life Publication, also a short article was used. MONICA had a poetic tribute for Fr. Charles Kerr published in St. Peter and Paul's Parish Newsletter. Her poem "Journa of Life" in calligraphy and illustrated by MARGY HENGY was framed for the Birthright office.

ROY MOORE had a recent article in **WRITE ON** section of the MANKATO FREE PRESS "Santa Claus in Bethlehem." ROY was also named to the Mankato Ambassador's list and received a certificate from the mayor during a ceremony at City Hall.

MEREDITH COOK and SHIRLEY ENSRUD each had a display of their poetry on exhibit at the first Annual Winterfest in Blue Earth, January 9-10, 1988.

AWARDS AND CONTEST RESULTS: DR. JOSEPHINE LIEBHABER has been selected as a recipient of the American Biographical Institute's Commemorative Medal of Honor. This is a limited issue medal bestowed upon a select group of 175 men and women whose achievements on local, state, national and/or international levels are worthy of documented recognition. JO also had a Christmas poem published in the Wells Newspaper.

** ERROR CORRECTION from the November/December report: (Bill asks forgiveness for omitting a line in retyping the report) PATRICIA's poem "Unexpected Shangri-la" received First Place in the Nature Category at Midwest Chaparral. However, it was "Bittersweet" that received the First Place in Syllabic Verse, Maxine A. Larson judging. Patricia also received Second Place nationally - The Schofield Award for this same poem; Second Place in the JFA Awards and since the last report - First Place - Stanzaic Form -Poetry Jacksonville's 1987 National Contest to be published in Prize Poems of Jacksonville - judge Ralph Hammond.

Market Lesson: Watch your contest rules. The reason this poem could win those four top awards is because it had not been published before. Remember, also there are a number of contests that will accept published poems.

PATRICIA also received (4) awards in the Mississippi Poetry Society's National Contest (South Branch): Second Place (Villanelle) - Second Place - Haiku Award; First Honorable Mention, The Crand Award and 3rd Honorable Mention. - Writers' Unlimited Award.

WILFRED received First Place in Time Theme Contest - Poets at Work - BILL's poem "Timestream."
