Patricia devoted thousands of hours each year to our organizations, working as editor, advocate, writer. She has influenced an entire generation of poets, and will be greatly missed.

Our tools are words. Words used for themselves, words used for originality, words used to enhance, to translate, words for myriad purposes. As writers, and specifically as poets we need to respect and court words. I suggest that we keep a notebook of words. More than just a place to jot ideas for poems or memory joggers, this should be a vessel to collect tools, gather resources for whatever future use we may find.

Sounds

Consider words as sounds or words that sound as they should:

giggle
tickle
static electricity
plop of a mop
hiccup
whoosh of water
blimp
jerk
wheeze

MAKE A LIST OF WORDS THAT ARE SOUND SPECTACULAR. YOU CAN USE A DICTIONARY, LISTEN TO PEOPLE AND LIFE AROUND YOU, OR JUST PONDER. YOU MAY WISH TO MAKE UP SOME WORDS AND SHOULD PLAN ON CONTINUING THIS EXERCISE FOR SEVERAL DAYS OR A LIFETIME.

MAKE A LIST OF FAVORITE NOUNS. TURN THEM INTO VERBS, ADJECTIVES OR ADVERBS AND GIVE THEM NEW LIFE: A CONVENTION OF HALLWAYS, A HANDFUL OF LIGHT.

Proscribed Feelings

In this day of advertising and controlling management techniques, words are propaganda:

Purex: Because Clean Never Goes Out of Style Buick: New Symbol for Quality in America I wish I were an Oscar Meyer Wiener Come to Marlboro Country

Rhythm

Similarly, the rhythm of words has long been acknowledged as a mnemonic device. Favorite nursery rhymes, universally recognized poems, and more advertising:

Mary had a little lamb...
I think that I shall never see
The Quicker Picker-Upper
Ummmm-Ummmm Good
Nothin' Says Lovin'....

FIND POEMS IN THE MEDIA. CHECK NEWSPAPERS, MAGAZINES, LISTEN TO COMMERCIALS. WE NEED TO RECAPTURE LANGUAGE FROM MADISON AVENUE. THIS CAN BE A START. FIND THE SUBLIMINAL POETRY MEANT TO SWAY YOU AND SWAY BACK.

Tone

The tone of the oral and written words varies their impact. How would a message or story seem if told by a variety of voices:

Parent or Child
Salesman
Doctor
Attorney
Sweetheart
Ex-husband or Ex-wife
Job Applicant

CHOOSE A FAVORITE POEM, YOURS OR SOMEONE ELSE'S, AND RE-WRITE IT IN THE VOICE OF ANOTHER NARRATOR. CHANGE THE AGE, THE SEX, THE POINT OF VIEW, BUT MOST OF ALL THE VOICE.

Source of Language

Where words originate effect their impact. Translators have puzzled long and hard when trying to move the words and ideas from one language to another. Their is always a challenge when we translate from one point of origin to another spot:

foreign language to native tongue (and vice versa) adult to child lifestyle to lifestyle

TRANSLATE A NURSERY RHYME INTO AN ADULT POEM (FREE VERSE OR TRADITIONAL)

TRANSLATE A DAY IN THE LIFE OF A SAILOR INTO THE WORDS OF A FARMER, OR ONE OCCUPATION INTO THE LANGUAGE OF ANOTHER ALIEN CAREER)

TRANSLATE A CLASSICAL MYTH INTO AN AP NEWS RELEASE
