## Contest Entry Rules:

All students school in Minnesota are eligible: whether attending public, parochial, private or home schooled. Submit two copies of ONE original poem. No more than 50 lines. If more than one page, staple the second page. TYPE THE POEM. Please do not use fancy typefaces, colored fonts, or illustrations. Submit only one poem per student per year.

One copy of the poem should contain only the poem with title. This poem goes to the Judge. If your name appears anywhere on the page (in the poem or after the poem) it will be disqualified.

The second copy should contain the following information: 1) student name and complete home address 2) student's grade and division (junior or senior) 3) school name, address and the school's phone number. 4) A statement "This is my original work." The student must sign this statement. 5). Poems submitted may have been published or may have won previous awards. Poems that disregard these entry rules will be disqualified. Please be considerate of our Judges. We want to see your work, but we need it to be in the correct format.

Nationally recognized poets judge the contest. The winners will have their poems published in a chapbook, which will be forwarded to all participating schools. The winners will also be sent to compete in the National Manningham competition. There they may win cash prizes and publication.

1. Encourage each other
2. Make specific constructive criticism. General criticism such as Tlike this poem" is not helpful.
3. Don't take yourse If too seriously, have fun.
4. Avoid using yords like bad or good. Instead ask yourself does this poem seem clear lo you? Instcad it's important to questions about the poem's clanity, if it has concrete inages, if it avoids uses of clichés, has a first and last line that is strong etc.

 MessageWe are fast approaching a number of contest deadlines. March $15^{\text {th }}$ is when the National Federation's 50 categories are due. A number of our assignments include poems which could be entered into the NFSPS contest.

Why enter contests? It isn't just for the thrill of hearing your name announced as a merit, honorable mention or winner, although I will admit that is a lot of fun. Entcring also helps improve our poetry. Every time I begin working on my entries, I scrutinize my poem. How can I improve the lines, the meter, and the way it appears on the page? I check spelling; I seatch for just the right word. I
dress my "baby" in its finest clothes and send it out into the world.

This is a great way to get your poems polished! Otherwise, we often just place our poems into a file once the assignment is done, and never work on them again. All pocms can benefit from some revision.

Don't be disappointed if there isn't a win the first time you send it out. Individual judges like different types of poetry, and just because one judge doesn't select it doesn't mean another won't like it.

But when the poem comes back, listen to the winners and look at your poem with a fresh eye. Were your images strong? Did you avoid clichés? How dynamic was your title? Again, at the end of a contest I often do some of my best revisions.

Be sure and enter this year! It is fun to have a large contingency of Minnesota poets entered. If you are present, you are able to read your winners at convention. All Minnesota Poets present celebrate your win with you, cheering and playing our loon calls.

This year, we want to get as many people down to San Antonio for the convention as possible. We are still working on the bus! SMPS membership will also be asked if some of our funds can bc used to help subsidize members who want to go, maybe for the first time.

Don't forget that contest deadline for NFSPSMarch $15^{\text {th }}$. If you don't enter, you can't win! Happy Writing!

## A Texas Poetry Fiesta

I was unsure of what to expect when attending the annual NFSPS poetry convention for the first time this luthe San Antonio, TX. I knew the next five days would be full of special speakers, workshops and competition awards, but what I also found was a place where some of the greatest poetic minds across the country were able to come together and share in their mutual passion of the written word. From the beginning of the convention to the final award ceremony, I found myself surrounded by artists whose range of experience and love of poetry challenged and inspired my own.

Not only did I benefit from the general atmosphere of camaraderie, I also had the amazing opportunity to learn from the expertise and wisdom of many incredible special speakers. Among my favorites was Trinidad Sanchez Jr., who used references to traditional Hispanic foods as symbols
and metaphors to highlight human experience as well as his culture and heritage in his book, Chicano Food is Hot. Marian Haddad complemented this when she spoke about writing between cultures, "the muse is not a separate identity," she said "but rather ourselves at heightened attention." I also loved Allen Birkelbach's talk about the difference between symbols and shrines. "Symbols sum up a large number of meanings and attitudes," he said "while a shrine represents something past a place in time where it exists; it is a holding place for symbols."

Perhaps the most powerful part of the conference was hearing the convention's key note speaker, Naomi Shihab Nye on Sunday night. "Poetry is the cheapest art," she said, speaking about the essence of poetry. "It can also be healing. Poetry is the place where you can feel the timeless- in poetry the beauty [of a passing moment] is not lost." She also gave advice on writing poetry, "Think about something you sayd how wife what you wish you would have said. Give yourself permission to read and write what you love... you don't have to prove anything."

By the time I left the conference, I had a notebook full of fledgling poems, a head full of practical advice and a heart full of the warm companionship of poets across the nation. I look forward to next year's convention with eager anticipation.

POETRY ASSIGNMENT OF
OCTOBER and NOVEMBER (we will share our your efforts at the Deep Valley Book Fair)

October Subject: A Poem that paints a portrait of someone, real or imaginary, with words instead of a paintbrush. Any form, 40 line limit

November "Cinquain" Form. The traditional cinquain is based on a syllable count. Line 1 - 2 syllables, line $2-4$ syllables, line $3-6$ syllables, line 4-8 syllables, line $5-2$ syllables. The modern cinquain is based on a word count of words of a certain type: line 1 - one word (noun) a title or name of the subject, line 2 - two words (adjectives) describing the title, line 3 - three words (verbs) describing anaction related to the title, line 4 -four words describing a feeling about the title, a complete sentence, line 5 - one word referring back to the title of the poem. Example:

> A Threat
> By Suzanne Honour
> Storm clouds, casting shadows over weary soldiers, threaten to cry heavy buckets of tears.
